## Apartment House Will Feature Glass

One of the most unusual apartment houses in the city will be constructed on Madison between a Bishop Court and Sixth, according to Russell Walker, who will be the owner.









The building is to be completed at Heroy and Longfellow by September, 1957.



### Spokane's New School Buildings: II---What the Critics Say

NOTE: This is the second of a series of articles on the program and policies of Spokane School District No. 81 in the planning and construction of new public school buildings. The first appeared on Sunday, July 10. Spokesman-Review staff writer Will Lindley has had the cooperation of school officials, architects and construction men in this summary of facts and opinion.—Editor.

Though school administration officials generally are well satisfied with buildings constructed in the last few years, they have met strong opposition in some quar-ters. The district has been charged with being in the practice of architecture and with de-signing unsafe schools.

The new buildings are of light construction, which opens bid-ding to home builders. They have been adapted by the district's plant department from original plans by a local architect. This has resulted in opposition from architects and general contrac-tors. However, representatives of

tors. However, representatives of both groups have stated more than money is involved. There are principles at stake, they state. Contractor Henry George has none so far as to ask the school board to dismiss everyone in the piant department who does con-struction work or drawn pians. "If it costs more, God help us, that is what made America what

it is, the free enterprise system," he said at a board meeting, "I say to you, you are treading on my toes and I don't like free enterprise disturbed anywhere in America."

In a letter to the board, architects who originally designed the standardized school were not aware that "wholesale use was to

### **Mount Spokane Site**

Plans to build this new transmitter building for the state patrol still are pending although Bording & Cook, Spokane, was named as low bidder on the job at \$22,115. The fireproof building, designed by architect Kenneth Brooks, would be built on Mount Spokane if funds in the state budget are available. Plans call for the building to be constructed of materials tested in Alaska for their ability to withstand cold weather. Three "dish" type antennas can be seen in the top section of the sketch. The Bon Marche is scheduled to request approval of a pedestrian overpass across Wall Street about 142 feet north of Main Avenue between the store and the core parking garage now under construction.

A second proposal for a skywalk is expected to come from Deaconess Hospital which seeks to construct a pedestrian overpass across Fifth Avenue about 235 feet east of Lincoln between the hospital and a proposed doctor's office on the south side of Fifth.

Other items on the commission's agenda include:

-A request from the Cedar Investment Co. Inc. to change an R-1 single family dwelling zone classification to R-3 multi-family residences classification at the corner of Thirty-second and Mt. Vernon Street.

-An application by the Glad Tidings Assembly of God Church, E4224 Fourth, to expand its site to build a new church building and parking lot on the west side of Havana Street between Fourth and Fifth Avenues.

At one point March 21, Peterson told the mayor:

Councilwoman Marilyn M. Stanton raised the question March 21 as to whether the city could require the owners of existing skywalks to open them up to other business establishments.

Corporation Counsel Richard F. Wronn said Friday there is no way the city could enforce such a requirement. He said the city could not retroactively change permits already issued.

In addition to Barrett and Peterson, the Skywaik Committee includes Tony Anderson, Vaughn P. Call, Jack Sand and Bruce M. Walker.

During the five-month period ended last December, the committee reviewed skywalk data, examined Spokane's current system and policies of other cities, met with businessmen who have constructed skywalks.




