EDWIN J. DALBY, NEWSMAN, DIES

Edwin J. Dalby, widely known waterfront reporter and for more than two decades marine editor of *The Seattle Post-Intelligencer*, died December 28 in a Seattle hospital.

Mr. Dalby, who had retired a few years ago, was a member of a pioneer Washington family. Since his retirement he had lived at the family residence near Union, on Hood Canal. He is survived by his widow, three sons and a daughter.

The Growth Of The Church

The original United Protestant Church, which eventually became known as the Central United Protestant Church, grew rapidly, and Sunday school classes were soon being started in school buildings throughout the city to accommodate the needs of families in these school area. As the need for additional churches became apparent, the State Council of Churches selected sponsors from the cooperating denominations. There are now five additional United Protestant Churches in Richland and West Richland functioning on the same basis as the original church, but each under the sponsorship of a different denomination.




FINE ARTS MUSEUM MODEL

Bebb & Gould, architects, have prepared the plans for the museum, which will contain ten picture galleries. Contractors will start work within ten days.

SEATTLE CIVIC BEAUTY



Exterior work on the new Seattle Art Museum in Volunteer Park is rapidly nearing completion. The \$250,000 structure, a gift to the city of Mrs. Eugene Fuller and her son, Dr. Richard E. Fuller, occupies a commanding space on the site of the old pavilion with a sweeping view of the city, Puget Sound, the Olympic Mountains and, to the eastward, Lake Washington and the Cascades. The building will house many valuable art exhibits. It is expected to be opened about June 1, 1933.

GLIMPSES OF THE NEW SEATTLE ART MUSEUM



THE PORTALS TO A STOREHOUSE OF ART TREASURES
A striking study of the main entrance to the recently opened Seattle Art Museum in Volunteer Park, which by its location in the forest and near modern American buildings of its type.

THE MAIN FOYER
The impressive hall across the front of the building, connecting the American and European wings, and opening upon the main entrance and a series of galleries. The walls are marble and a fine floor with gold fittings. The ceiling is of a gold and silver design.



THE JADE ROOM
Here is housed the finest collection of its kind in America, one of numerous gifts, consisting of vases and other articles of jade, most of which were brought originally for the emperor's gift to ancient China.



THE GARDEN COURT
A room of striking beauty, it lies directly beyond the main entrance and is furnished with plants and a collection of paintings, statues, both Chinese and American.



ONCE THE SEAT OF AN EMPEROR
An original Chinese throne of the eighteenth century from the Peking Imperial collection. It is of richly carved oakwood, behind it an original Chinese wall design.



IN THE CHINESE GALLERY
Here, bronzes and palace furnishings, high, hangings and furniture and other precious objects from ancient imperial collections are shown.



THE TERRACE FOUNTAIN
A detail of the fountain, an aluminum fountain at a corner of the capitol square building. The fountain structure, designed by the artist, Dr. Richard E. Fuller and his mother, Mrs. Eugene Fuller.




MING BRONZES




A GLIMPSE OF THE FRONT GALLERY

Manhattan Floor Carpet Lobby
 Ample facilities have been provided on the mezzanine floor, which completely encircles the lobby. Surrounding the marble steps, one built himself steps were faced mahogany carpet which completely covers the mezzanine floor. Here writing desks have been provided for the convenience of the guests, and a telephone has been placed in one corner so that it is unnecessary for guests receiving a telephone call to step down to the benches on the main floor. A cigar terrace has been fitted up with bronzed wood furniture, upholstered with tapestry.

Banquet Table Original
 A unique banquet table has been provided for use in this room, and is the original idea of Mr. Carl Merck. This table is built up in sections, but differs from the ordinary banquet table in that it has supports of angle-iron posts, instead of the customary wooden knees. The idea in the construction being to avoid the inconvenience to the guests in being separated from the main room by auxiliary doors, and can be shut off entirely if two separate organizations are meeting at the same time.

The Mock Kitchen in Captain Herold and Lane Contractors' Hall Built Throughout
 On this floor also will be found a small room equipped with a washbowl, which is used for printing the various forms and cash checks used in the hotel. In one corner of the mezzanine floor are two private offices, both furnished with mahogany furniture, and are used by Manager Colquhoun and Assistant Manager Merck.
 In the opposite corner is a room of special size, which has been found not used as a first-class laundry parlor for the convenience of women patrons of the hotel.
 The mezzanine elevator bank descends to the second floor guest rooms, of which there are fourteen. In one corner of this floor is the Orange Room, which is used as a meeting place for civic organizations, such as the Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs. The room has a capacity of 150 people, with a small stage adjoining which seats twenty-five, making one hundred and thirty-five in all. This small room is separated from the main room by auxiliary doors, and can be shut off entirely if two separate organizations are meeting at the same time.

Guest Rooms Very Attractive
 All the floors above the second are of similar design and provide the balance of the sleeping quarters. The hallways are extremely wide, carpeted with




SPOKANE MURDERER MUST HANG

SPOKANE, Sept. 13 — (AP) — George Miller was found guilty of the murder of John Evester today, and was sentenced to hang at the Washington state penitentiary in Walla Walla.

The state charged Miller with cold-bloodedly shooting Evester, a clerk, during the robbery of the railway express agency here last fall. Several hundred dollars was the loot.

Two men took part in the robbery, but the second man has not been apprehended.

The jury considered the case almost 30 hours.


